



COMBINED CEREMONY FOR THE PRESENTATION OF THE SILVER LEGION, GOLDEN LEGION AND PALLADIAN LEGION

SETTING

Six (6) blue candlesticks evenly spaced on a table. This table may be the speakers table, but it is best if it is a separate one directly in front of the speaker, yet not hiding the Master of Ceremonies from the audience. This arrangement will enable six brothers to face the audience by standing BEHIND the table, each in front of a candle. It is also suggested that they take their places just before the ceremony begins and that they be undergraduate members of a chapter or representatives of an alumni club when possible. They will each have been assigned the name of one of the Founders and will arrange themselves on their own left to right accordingly in this order: Robert Morrison, John McMillan Wilson, Robert Thompson Drake, John Wolfe Lindley, Ardivan Walker Rogers, and Andrew Watts Rogers. The man assigned the name of *Robert Morrison* will have a box of matches, and, if possible, a taper in his hand.

Master of Ceremony: “Each year, Phi Delta Theta is proud to honor brothers on certain special anniversaries of their initiation into our great brotherhood. The Silver Legion recognizes twenty-five-year members and the Golden Legion honors fifty-year members. The Palladian Legion recognizes our most senior members in five-year increments beginning with their fifty-fifth year of membership continuing to their seventy-fifth year. Brothers in the bond and friends of Phi Delta Theta, we pause at this moment to do honor to those brothers who are with us this evening and who signed *The Bond* twenty-five or more years ago. By the same token, we pay homage to the Immortal Six, the Founders of our Fraternity, the first to affix their signatures to that unaltered covenant to which we have all pledged our sacred word and honor.”

The brother assigned the name of Morrison lights his taper (a tool that has a handle bearing a wick at one end and a cup for extinguishing on the other) and all other lights are extinguished, leaving the room in darkness except for the lighted taper. If possible, a small group sings one chorus of a Phi Delta Theta song (“Phi Delta Theta We Love You”). As they hum the second chorus, without hurry, the brother representing Morrison shall light the candle in front of him, pronouncing the name Robert Morrison in firm, clear tones. Again, without hurry, he hands the taper to his neighbor who lights his candle, pronouncing the name of John McMillan Wilson and so on, until six candles are similarly lighted and the taper extinguished. The choral group finishes the song.

Master of Ceremony: “What is our open motto?”

Brothers: “Εἰς ἀνὴρ οὐδεὶς ἀνὴρ”

Master of Ceremony: “Its translation?”

Brothers: “We enjoy life by the help and society of others.”

Candle lighters return, unhurried, to their seats and lights come on again.

Master of Ceremony: “We have just witnessed a simple ceremony which symbolizes the beacon set by our Founders over a hundred and _____ years ago to guide their own and the steps of their successors to noble living, not only on paths of the campus but on the highways of postgraduate life. The ceremony also typifies the rekindling of the loyalty, devotion and gratitude of all of us to those Founders whose sense of brotherhood and high ideals found expression in the creation of Phi Delta Theta at Miami University, in Oxford, Ohio, on December 26, 1848.

We shall not cease to be grateful to these men whose vision was of a friendship originating on the campus, projecting itself into the realities of the world, and making life finer and better for the thousands who would sign *The Bond*.

To be a Phi for even a day has its compensations. The satisfactions of membership accumulate with the years. Its influence extends over a life made increasingly richer in culture, in character, and enduring friendships.

For some who signed *The Bond* fifty years or more ago, memories of those early days may be somewhat vague but not without pleasure as they go back through the years to the old chapter hall and there reveal the altar before which these Brothers took their vows or heard them taken by others, vows which do no violence to their God, their country, or themselves.

No man can sit in the presence of Golden Legionnaires and pretend that membership in Phi Delta Theta is but a campus interlude. Once exposed to *The Bond*, its influence extends over a lifetime. *The Bond* contains a philosophy which makes for those who accept it, genuinely, a life that is full and rich in those things that do not perish. *The Bond* is the warranty which gives Phi Delta Theta its right and its duty to live and to serve young men and old, and it is in the spirit of *The Bond* that I summon to this place before me the candidate[s] for the Golden Legion. Please withhold your applause until the end of the ceremony.”

Again, if a choral group is available, have a quiet song sung while the sponsors bring the candidate(s) to the Master of Ceremony.

Again, if a choral group is available, have a quiet song sung while the sponsors bring the candidates to the Master of Ceremony.
